Time Traveler Hotline/Art read on air alleged John Titor fax Past & Future Events

Steve - Time Traveler

AB: "We are taking calls from time travelers tonight, and if you are one of those, we have set aside a specific number. This time it is the 'wild card' line

Now, if I get a really good time traveler – a really, *chatty* time traveler – I may in fact allow some questions ... allow my time traveler to in effect be interviewed here on the air ... by some of you (!)

So we'll see as the night progresses."

[less than five (5) minutes later]

AB: "Wild card line – actually Time Traveler line – you are on the air. Hello."

STT: "Ah, greetings, Art Bell."

AB: "Yessir, ah, you are a time traveler?"

STT: "Yes I am. This is a ex-Man-In-Black, but not quite yet ex-Time Traveler ... Steve."

STEVE – TIME TRAVELER

AB: "Ohh!"

STT: "From months ago, yes."

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AB: "A ... a lotta ... a lot of ... a lot of people have been waiting for a return call from you, Steve."

STT: "I've been very busy with the, ah, Tri-Lateralists ... especially here lately."

AB: "So you too are suggesting that there is definitely a sort of One World, ah, police-controlled type future for us?"

STT: "Unfortunately, there is some good news and some bad news in that respect."

AB: "Yes?"

STT: "Ah, the good news is, is that ultimately 'All's Well That Ends Well.' Ah, unfortunately for everyone that wants to prevent it, it actually began with the Congress of Vienna in the year 1814 ... and 1815."

AB: "Ahh, well that's a long time ago, Steve."

STT: "Umm-hmm."

AB: "Um, what ... what about the future? I mean, we can look into the past ..."

STT: "Umm-hmm."

AB: "... from our year of 1998."

STT: "Umm-hmm."

AB: "What we need for you is to tell us what's coming."

STT: "Oh, wow! Ah, in what respect would you be interested in? Anything ..."

AB: "Oh ..."

STT: "... at all?

Anything ... no question unanswered."

AB: "All right ... all right.

Um, for starters, describe what our future is to be in the year you have come from."

STT: "Well, I go in a, ah, what I'd like to call a, ah, trans-connected loop, ah, so I can come back of course to the timeline dimension I left originally. Back and forth.

And through that I can get as far as only as I ... I can travel only as far into the future as I will exist in my next lifetime ... or the one after that.

If I don't exist in this dimension in the next lifetime I will ... can't go in that far."

AB: "In other words, okay, I think I understand."

STT: "Yes!"

AB: "You can only travel ..."

STT: "... in my lifetime."

AB: "Ah, in your lifetime or your next lifetime if it should be in this dimen- ..."

STT: "Right."

AB: "... dimension."

STT: "And so far that takes us up to twenty-two eighty-six (2286)."

AB: "Twenty-two eighty-six (2286).

Well ..."

STT: "Right ... eighty."

AB: "... that will do. That'll do.

STT: "Umm-hmm."

AB: "Um, what can you tell us about 1998 – specifically July forward?"

STT: "From July of 1998 A.D. forward?"

AB: "Yah!"

STT: "The most important thing is, ah, to realize the, ah, un- ... unusual, um, media control of political issues. Apparently all you seem to need is a, ah, media perspective, and everyone seems to say: 'Well, this must be the way it is.'

But you must realize what will change most in the future. Starting in 1999, for example, is that, ahh, as more Time goes on, it be clearer that the media is creating the false sense that Bill Clinton, for example, or the United States is in control of the world, when in fact, they never have been!

And it will ultimately be revealed that, in fact, the British Empire never even ended in the first place (!) And it still continues in this day."

AB: "Hmm."

STT: "With London, of course, being the center where the Illuminati is actually located ... ah, today."

AB: "The Illuminati?"

STT: "Umm-hmm. Established in 1776."

AB: "And the Illuminati controls everything?"

STT: "No. Ah, illuminati are like what you would think of as in-between ... gobetweens. Between the Pleiadeans and the Freemasons (!) Who ... the Freemasons, they're located in London ... actually their main headquarters are ... world headquarters.

And then that would make the United States from 1815 onward, ah ... ah, like a province of, ah, Great Britain for all practical purposes (!) And everyone knows this that's elected President! And they [sic – there] will be documents released in the Twenty-First (21st) Century to even prove this!

That's one of the things they've got classified Abo[ve] Top Secret now."

AB: "There is something that I ... I wish to ask you about."

STT: "Anything at all ... anything."

AB: "Fine. Um, as you all know our President Kennedy was assassinated ..."

STT: "Uh-huh."

AB: "... in Dallas."

STT: "Unfortunately."

AB: "And many of the files that relate to that assassination have been sealed for fifty (50) years."

STT: "Some seventy (70)."

AB: "Some seventy (70).

We would like to know what it is we don't know about that assassination that will be revealed when these files are opened?"

STT: "Well, I can tell you everything (!) Ah, but I'll also tell you there are some aspects that will never be revealed, because the people sealing them do not understand the whole thing (!)

But there's a dual aspect to the Kennedy Assassination, and it's also tied in with the Robert Kennedy Assassination in one respect. And that is that, ah ... um, the CIA [Central Intelligence Agency] did not do it!"

AB: "Umm-hmm."

STT: "And neither did any other government agency.

Ah, it was done by a coalition of British Intelligence and national security agents that were not part of the main group, that had decided that if they had not killed Kennedy by the end of 1963 or by the beginning of 1964, they knew that *he* would be responsible for *accidentally* causing a nuclear war in his next term!"

AB: "Really?"

STT: "Yes. And the proof was ... Robert McNamara. He delivered the proof that ... that unintentionally killed Kennedy. Because, ah, one day in 1963, Robert McNamara turned up in the Oval Office – he was literally burned – and claimed ... Robert McNamara did ... walked in one day in '63 and claimed that he'd just go[ne] there from 1971 (!) And they [sic – there] was [sic – were] then two (2) McNamaras.

And the 1971 McNamara claimed there was a nuclear war and he ... and he had been sent back by the Pleiadeans or somebody to try to stop it!

And then this is when, of course, the Pleiadeans ... Illuminati in 1963 said: 'We believe you. We'll take this serious (!)'

At first they thought: 'Well, this is an alternate – it won't happen!

But ultimately they realized that everything he said was true, and, ah, that's why Kennedy had to be killed ... and it's very unfortunate (!)

That's why they even arranged to have the killer to be, ah, elusive. In fact, it was not even Oswald! Oswald is ... is as a matter of fact still alive (!) and living in Australia today (!)

The actual killer of Kennedy was Marilyn Monroe (!) Ah, who had ..."

AB: "Marilyn Monroe !!!"

STT: "Yeah, she was the gun on the grassy knoll (!) And her death was faked in 1962 (!) and ... in order to train her to be an assassin."

AB: "You're beginning to push the limits of my, ah, my credibility meter here."

STT: "Oh ... oh, you're using the 'truster [sic?] thing'?"

AB: "No!"

STT: [Unintelligible – 'Why do that?' (?)]

AB: "No, I'm not!"

STT: "Heh!"

AB: "No, I'm not!

My personal ..."

STT: "Oh!"

AB: "... twister-meter ..."

STT: "Yeah ... [unintelligible]"

AB: "[Unintelligible] ... inside my gut.

I mean, come on! Marilyn Monroe's death was faked and then she killed Kennedy? (!)"

STT: "That's what the files will say when they're released in, ah ..."

AB: "In what? A rage over being, ah ..."

STT: "Well, if ... see, she would be ... if you listen to what I say closely, she would have to have had her death faked in 1962 to be the assassin. Ahh, it's a [train [?] – unintelligible].

Of course, ah, he was not ... his number was not up till '63, so, ah, when they asked for volunteers, she volunteered, but she was already an assassin – it had nothing to do with him personally (!)"

AB: "Marilyn Monroe was an assassin? (!)"

STT: "Yes! And she worked with the mob in 1962-63, and it was only later she volunteered for that assignment. But she was always ... [unintelligible]."

AB: "Holy mackerel!

Ah ..."

STT: "A little complicated."

AB: "A little complicated!"

STT: "Ah!"

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AB: "What about our space program, Steven?"

STT: "Ohhh! Are you in for a huge surprise!"

AB: "Oh, surprise me!"

STT: "Well, you may have heard that the Freemasons ... or you may not have heard that ... that the ones in Britain chose all the lunar landing sites (!)"

AB: "Uh-huh."

STT: "Would you care to guess why they chose these sites?"

AB: "Ummm!"

STT: "It's a little obvious, but not very much so."

AB: "No, I don't think I wanta guess ... tell me."

STT: "They knew where the ruins were at on the Moon ... Egyptian ruins. And so they plotted the landings to be clear of all the, ah, lunar ruins.

And when Neil Armstrong got done with his: "One small step for man ...' thing ..."

AB: "Yes?"

STT: "You know, where Aldrin was adjusting the camera and they hadn't had it on line yet – you know the one they were adjusting?"

AB: "Yes."

STT: "Armstrong went to a nearby, ah, knoll ... like a hill ... that was, ah, he had orders to go to the nearest, highest hill in the area immediately after arranging the Stars and Stripes [U.S. flag]. And he proceeded to this nearby hill, and he, ah, unzipped his ... a little pack- ... pack- ... a little package he had with him and he pulled out the British 'Union Jack' flag and erected it on the highest hill in the area at Tranquility base.

And it is in fact still there to this day."

AB: "You're kidding!"

STT: "I'm seri- ... no, I'm not!"

AB: "No, you're not."

STT: "Ah, it's a very unusual fact, but, ah, all the astronauts were of Anglo-Saxon descent, except on the last trip, one (1) of the astronauts you'll recall was a scientist by the name of Schmitt of German descent.

And they warned NASA: If they put anyone up there who was not of Anglo-Saxon descent, they would stop the space program!

They gave 'em a warning! ... Ah, but they didn't listen!

And if anyone out there is wondering why they were UFOS that were, ah, sighted along with the Apollo missions, it was because that the Pleiadeans were tryin' to protect the astronauts coming and going from the Moon from other, um, extraterrestrials or extra-dimensionals that would ... would have been hostile, including the ones that nuked an alternate Earth that McNamara's double was, ah, lucky enough to escape from."

AB: "Barely apparently."

STT: "Hmm ... unusual, but all provable ... and in your lifetime (!)"

AB: "All right."

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AB: "Um, we are now having a great deal of discussion about the Y2K [Year 2000] problem."

STT: "Yes, that's a very serious situation."

AB: "So it is real?"

STT: "Oh, it's real all right!"

AB: "What happens January 1st, 2000?"

STT: "Ah, well, (STT laughs), some people are ... are ... that take it seriously will personally, you know, they can personally get ready for it.

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But for those corporations that believe, you know, it's hype. It's all ... remember that guy claiming it was all hype? Well, remember that guy from the future that said it was all hype?"

AB: "Yeah."

STT: "He did say that he lived in a controlled society where they controlled everything they learned."

AB: "That's correct."

STT: "So if he was living after some kind of major situation with the Y2K thing, they might not want to admit that they were weak enough to have that happen to 'em. So see it could have been serious, but he wouldn't have known it

Ah, actually what's going to happen is that a lot of computer systems will shut down. And what is most interesting is that, ah, the government has what I call 'Roswell technology' and they, in fact, are going to try to, ah, bring on a back-up system that they're working on now. Some kind of 'supercomputer' at Area 51 out there.

They're shakin' their head 'no', but I'm tellin' anyway. And, ah, they're ... they're apparently gonna try to over-affect the lines to where they can tap into the, ah ... ah, the web and protect it and the information structure, for example."

AB: "Steve, ah, we are at the bottom of the hour."

STT: "Yeah?"

AB: "Do ... do you wanta hold on?"

STT: "Absolutely!"

AB: "Ahh ..."

STT: "I have no reason not to."

AB: "All right, Steve. Stay right there.

A Time Traveler named Steve. I'm Art Bell. This is Coast to Coast AM."

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AB: "Top of the, ah, the morning to you, everybody!

It's great to be here!

My, my, my ... what a night we're having, huh?

I've got a Time Traveler on the line – at least that's what he says he is. His name is Steve ... and we've had him call before.

And I'm going to let a couple of you I think speak with Steve and ask questions. Let's try that.

Steve, are you still there?"

STT: "I'm present."

AB: "All right ... good!

Um, let's take a couple of calls and see what people say."

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Aud: "... I didn't understand what he was saying about his time travel (!)"

STT: "Ah!"

AB: "What aspect? Whaddya mean?"

Aud: "I'm talking about the Area 51 thing."

AB: "That has ... Area 51?

I don't think he's even mentioned it."

STT: "Yep."

Aud: "I thought that he did ... in the first part of the conversation he did."

AB: "Steve?"

STT: "Yeah, ah, that's where the supercomputer [is] that's gonna rescue everything, if everything goes very bad at Y2K.

But, ah, yeah, there was an original Time-strip out there, but it was illegally constructed. It was the RPM – Roswell Proton Module."

AB: "Umm-hmm."

STT: "But that was ... that was left there in 1947. It was not meant to be discovered till the Twenty-Third (23rd) Century. And, ah, because it was a danger, it needed to be protected ... and kept until the time it was meant to be used.

Ah, there's been a lotta Pleiadean activity at that base. And what better place to locate, ah, the Pleiadean technology needed to send somebody like me into the future to keep checking up on things being done today. Every little thing you do today makes the future a little different and it causes variations. And when you have a plan or in this case, a new plan, and you want the future to turn out a certain way, then you have to keep changing little things. And when you change things unintentionally, you wanta go up and check, and then come back and redo it if it turns out the way you don't want."

AB: "All right."

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Aud: "He claims he's from the future?"

AB: "Yes ... oh, yes!"

STT: "Oh, no actually I'm from the present, but I travel through past, present, future ... from Atlantis to the end of the Earth, actually."

Aud: "And what part of the future are you from? What time?"

STT: "I'm from a, ah, an ... an alternate version of 1986 and I've lived here in this Timeline from what you would think of as January 1986."

Aud: "Is there ... has NASA gone any further than what it has now ... in the future?"

STT: "You mean, in the future?"

Aud: "Yes."

STT: "Of course, ah, but the ... but its program is that the reason they're holding back is because, ah, there's a limit ... there's a plan that they're going on.

They have this plan to where everything is repeating itself on I ... I think the precise number is 1,962 year cycles times three (3). And you get Atlantis (!)

And they're tryin' to not speed ... have a space program that goes faster and accomplishes more in a given amount of time than was accomplished

the first time in a given amount of time. So NASA is ... unbeknownst to anyone at NASA, they're being controlled in such a way that where they go and ... and the timing of it has to fall into that category. So in the future NASA, of course, will eventually in a coalition with the European Space Agency actually land on the planet Mars once. Ah, and then later on there'll be a European colonization of Mars, but that won't begin until after World War Three (3)."

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Aud: "Art, I'm sorry, but Steve is hard to believe. Call me a skeptic if you will.

Ah, I consider myself not to be one really, but nevertheless I would like to hear a prediction within the *near* future that would prove to be true."

AB: "So, give us something near-term."

STT: "How near-term?"

AB: "Well, I don't know! I'm just repeating ..."

SIT: "Oh! Oh!"

AB: "... you know?"

STT: "Um ... ah, let's see."

AB: "You can pick it."

STT: "Okay ... let me see. If I had called last week, I could told you that Clinton would testify, but we're too close to that now."

AH: "We certainly are! He's already said that he would so that wouldn't be good."

STT: "Yeah."

AB: "Ah, now ... now, I ... I ... I'll tell you what you could tell us."

STT: "Okay."

AB: "How it turns out?"

STT: "It turns out that, ah, it doesn't really damage the Presidency in any way whatsoever, and it does continue on."

AB: "Uh-huh.

Um, all right, um, very good."

STT: "Umm-hmm."

AB: "Ah, let's keep moving along here ..."

STT: "All right."

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Aud: "And with Steve ..."

STT: "Yes?"

Aud: "... ah, you keep using words like 'maybe' and 'supposedly' what might happen in Y2K ..."

STT: "Umm-hmm."

Aud: "... and if you've seen the future, I would like to know if you could tell us more exactly what *would* happen, and not 'what might' or 'what could'."

STT: "Well, that depends on what Timeline you're in.

And ... and ... and the Timeline we want to happen (!)

Ah, the Y2K problem is a serious thing and it causes all the computers to shut down, of course, except for conveniently the ones controlled by, ah, British, ah, Telecom and stuff like that."

AB: "Ah-ha!"

STT: "But that's what we're working on.

I've even got a program myself, but, ah ... ah, if ... if worse comes to worse and, ah, everything went down, the first thing you'd see when it came back up on the screens all over the world would be the Union Jack, but they kinda reject that – they thought it might be a dead giveaway to who was behind this (!)
